
Food Security Further Critiqued

"puts the aspirations, needs and livelihoods of those who produce, distribute and consume food at the heart of food systems and policies rather than the demands of markets and Corporations."












Capitalism and Food



Redwood Roots Farm

Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) is a partnership between a farm and a community of supporters. CSA members commit to a farm for a whole growing season by purchasing a CSA share. The farmer then provides each member with a weekly distribution of fresh, seasonal produce at the peak of ripeness and nutrition.

In a typical CSA arrangement, customers pay upfront before receiving food. CalFresh recipients can use their benefits to participate in a CSA, but can only pay for up to two weeks of food in advance.


